Greetings again from the Mile High City. This month, we're talking restaurants, pubs, and clubs. Essentials to any great writing convention!

First, let's start with food. For a true taste of the old west, you'll want to go to The Buckhorn Exchange, 1000 Osage St. The feature here is meat, including the eclectic, so for vegetarians or those who don't like hundreds of dead animal heads mounted on the wall, this place is not for you! True old west, and lots of fun. \$\$\$

If you're looking for a place to take a large group, **Duo** might be the place for you. With a deliahtful atmosphere and New American cuisine, they have something for everyone, and the food is fabulous. \$\$

For those of you who would like a touch of the British, try **The British Bulldog** on 2052 Stout St. Saturday and Sunday mornings are especially busy as local soccer fans gather to watch the clubs play and indulge in two eggs runny, rashers of bacon, bangers, a fat slice of fried tomato, baked instead? Ok, if you're in the beans, and black pudding.

Oh, and two free drafts of beer come with your meal.

For those of you who would like a bit of Denver history along with British tradition, be sure to participate in one of The Brown Palace Hotel's afternoon teas. For decades, the hotel, at 321 17th St, has been offering perfectly brewed Darjeeling, tea cakes, finger sandwiches, and scones with Devonshire cream. Yum!

Like your food by category market for Italian, head to



Venice Ristorante, 1700 Wynkoop St. Italian food staples include pastas, lobster-stuffed ravioli, and multi-course tastings. \$\$

Prefer Asian fare? Get a cab and head to New Saigon, 630 S. Federal Blvd. After Vietnam, Vietnamese immigrants flooded this area and luckily for us, brought the flavors from their old home here. \$

Ah, so you like the palate of the French instead? Then head to Z Cuisine, 2239 W. 30th Ave. The dish many ao after here is the cassoulet maison, but there is plenty of other delicacies as well.

A bonus? They have the best wine list in town too. Just say "Je voudrais du vin."

Which leads us right into the next important topic - pubs! No writer's conference or convention is ever complete without them so here you go... looking for an intimate bar with the best beer list in town? Head to **Falling Rock Tap** House, 1919 Blake St. There are more than 70 brews on tap here, and they're all craft brewed. Enough said.

Another great beer place is the Wynkoop Brewing Co., 1634 18th St. Around for more than 20 years, it was a pioneer in the microbrew industry, and

existed long before LoDo (Lower Downtown) was ever on the map.

Like your alcohol a bit harder than wine and beer? Then think about heading to Mezcal, 3230 E. Colfax Ave, which as the name implies, features every kind of tequila and Mezcal you could imagine. Our only request is that you that you take extra pictures once the shots begin.

Ready to go clubbing? Consistently hailed as one of the 100 best jazz clubs in the world, Dazzle, 930 Lincoln St, is a great place to gather friends for happy hour or a late night outing.

If you like rock music, and an intimate bar where the sound is fantastic, check out the Hi-Dive on 7 S. Broadway. In just a few short vears, the Hi-Dive has become known as Denver's place to discover future rock sensations.

Ok, you're in Denver, and you're thinking – what's with

this jazz and rock thing? I want to go country dancing with my LCC friends! Then hail a taxi and head to The Grizzly Rose, 5450 N. Valley Hwy. This is the true shit-kickin' saloon, complete with mechanical bull and oldwestern photo shoot. So line up those LCC friends for a promising memorable experience!




Tasha Alexander


Teresa Schwegel

Her third novel, PERSON OF INTEREST, about an undercover cop whose disintegrating home life could send him over the edge, came out on 11-27-08.




Marcus Sakey

In several reviews, Marcus Sakey's first novel, THE BLADE ITSELF, draws comparisons to Dennis Lehane's MYSTIC RIVER on more than a few occasions. Those are pretty bia shoes to fill, but Marcus appears to have what it takes. THE BLADE ITSELF was featured on CBS Sunday Mornina and NPR, and was both aNY Times Editor's pick and one of Esquire Magazine's top 5 picks of 2007. It has sold in 8 countries, and Ben Affleck and Matt Damon's production company purchased the movie rights for Miramax. His second novel, AT THE CITY'S EDGE, comes out on 1-22-08.



Sheila Lowe

A court aualified handwriting expert with more than 30 years of forensic handwriting experience, Sheila Lowe recently tapped into her knowledge of integrity screening and personality identification to create the Claudia Rose mystery series. Her debut, POISON PEN, was a March 2007 release from Capital Crime Press. The series was quickly picked up by Penguin, and the second, WRITTEN IN BLOOD, will be a September 2008 release. Watch for Sheila to do a panel or two at LCC. And who knows? Maybe Sheila will be around to analyze your penmanship when you scrawl your name across that next cocktail napkin!

THE PALM, 1672 Lawrence St. Denver's most well recognized faces are on the walls and seated at the tables.


COLORADO STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, 200 E. Colfax. All the state politicians gathered under one roof. What IS that smell?
