We're glad you decided to attend the 10th anniversary of Left Coast Crime. There are so many things to do during the convention, you'll be busy every minute. If you can manage to squeeze in a bit of sightseeing, there are lots of things to see and do in and around Tucson:

- The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum is a great place to explore all that the desert southwest has to offer. From minerals to wildlife, there's something sure to please everyone. Allow several hours to see everything, and be sure to wear sunscreen and a hat and drink plenty of fluids. Fee.

- Kartchner Caverns, located near the town of Benson, just opened to the public a few months ago. Kartchner rivals Carlsbad Caverns in beauty and is well worth the trip. Prior reservations are required, so call first. 1-520/586-CAVE. Fee.
- The Arizona Renaissance Festival provides entertainment, food and fun for all ages. Artisans display their wares for sale, stunt riders perform in three daily jousts, and a variety of artists perform on 12 different stages. Don't miss the singing

nuns! The festival runs Saturday and Sunday this weekend and next. Gates are open from 10 am to 6 pm. Buy your admission tickets at Fry's Grocery Store and save \$1 per ticket. The festival is held near Apache Junction, close to Phoenix. I always take my parasol and wear sunscreen. Fee.

- Sabino Canyon is a lovely oasis in the desert. Hike to a 20-ft waterfall, or just take a guided tram ride. Fee.
- Flandrau Planetarium, located on the University of Arizona campus, has terrific hands-on science activities for adults and children. Be sure to leave enough time after the show to check out all the activities. The University community is on Spring Break, so it should be quiet. Pay parking is available near the Planetarium, if you can get to it in spite of all the construction. Fee.
- The Tucson Mall has all the shops you ever wanted, and then some. If you want to cool off, buy some souvenirs, or just people watch, you can do it here.
- The Grand Canyon is a must, if you have a few extra days to spend in Arizona. For a change of pace, take the old steam train from Williams into the Canyon. Reservations are required, so call first.

While you're here, take advantage of all the activities we've arranged for you: be a Mystery Jeopardy contestant, tour the new Federal Courthouse, take in a few panels, and check out the raffles and auctions. Wear your western costume (historical or contemporary) Friday and you might win a prize! Visit the dealer room often without worry—we have a shipping service available to mail your new books home.

Guest of Honor: Sue Grafton

How could anyone resist a heroine who believes, "As long as you have sufficient toilet paper, how far wrong can life go?" Obviously not many people, if we judge by the increasing popularity of Kinsey Millhone, P. I., from her initial appearance in "A" Is For Alibi in 1982 to her most recent outing in "O" Is For Outlaw in 1999. Sue Grafton's fifteen Millhone novels have sold over 40 million in this country alone and have been translated into twenty-six other languages. They have won award after award for the best mystery of the year; for example, four Anthonys from Bouchercon, two Shamuses from Private Eve Writers of American, and eight Doubleday Mystery Guild Awards. Few writers in the mystery genre have been as popular or as influential as Sue Grafton.

Grafton grew up in Louisville, the child of alcoholic parents who loved literature but often left her to her own devices. She learned to parent herself and to survive. There's no surprise that much of Grafton's own strengths are echoed in the self-sufficient character of Kinsey Millhone. She is funny, tough, smart, and determined to balance the scales of justice by finding the killer even if she puts herself at great risk. Readers are engaged by her minimalist life-style, with her rusty VW bug and her tiny apartment rented from shipshape adorable Henry Pitts. They laugh at her eating habits, and they usually have no desire to emulate her fondness for peanut-butter-and-pickle sandwiches. but they often envy the ease with which Kinsey dresses in turtle-necks and jeans, not giving a hoot what anyone thinks of her car or clothes.

Kinsey echoes her creator in other ways: both have been divorced twice, both have an acute distaste for receiving injections, both are tidy and well organized, and both are addicted to regular exercise. Grafton owned that blue bug long before Kinsey did, and they both started taking Spanish lessons at the same time. Also, many of Grafton's early job experiences—as a staffer, as hospital a secretaryreceptionist, as a file clerk, as a temp who worked as a maid-are reflected in the word in which Kinsey operates.

The two are not twins, however, for Grafton has been happily married for over twenty years to Steven Humphrey, a professor of philosophy at USC-Santa Barbara and the University of Louisville. They are sociable people, dividing their time between their primary home in Santa Barbara (on which Santa Teresa is closely based) and their second home in Sue's hometown, Louisville. They are appalled by Kinsey's fondness for junk food, and they are excellent cooks. Their homes are filled with Sue's quilt collection, Steven's antique scientific instruments, and their cats. They relish visits from friends and family, especially Sue's three adult children and two grandchildren, one of whom is named 'Kinsey.' " Talle of anibul of anibul

In appreciation for this pleasant life, Grafton has a car tag that reads, "THNX KNZY."

Grafton began to create Kinsey in the late 1970's. Although successful as a writer of screenplays and teleplays, Grafton decided to focus increasingly on her own writing; for a genre, she turned

to her early love of hard-boiled detective fiction. Kinsey is the classic loner private eye, smart-mouthed, often cynical, yet heroic to the core. But, significantly, Kinsey also breaks ground in her gender, her introspection, the frequency with which compassion is part of her response to a case, and her interest in understanding her case and herself in broader social and moral contexts.

When "A" appeared, most publishers had assumed the reading public would not accept a woman in the hard-hitting roles occupied by a Philip Marlowe or a Sam Spade. Only Marcia Muller had begun to breach this barrier, but in 1982 Grafton's first novel, along with Sara Paretsky's first V. I. Warshawski novel, changed the face of detective fiction. 'Strong' no longer automatically has to mean 'male', nor does 'tough' require a high body count. Anyone going into a bookstore today will be inundated with mystery novels featuring women who are professional P. I.s—a fictional generation of women who are both strong and responsible, women who can thoughtfully analyze what led the villain into evil and still be able to punch that villain right in the nose. They are credible women who, like Kinsey, may be afraid of injections, but they are indefatigable in their determination to find and defeat the killer.

Countless readers would suggest that the car tag *should* read, "THNX GRFTN."



Toastmaster: Harlan Coben

I first met Harlan Coben when he arrived at EYECON'95, a little party I helped throw in Milwaukee to honor the private eye writers that I knew and loved. Harlan Coben I neither knew nor loved. Who was this guy? My first



impression of him was that he was twice as big as I was, and a man that tall should not be weeping. Why was he crying? Because this his first convention, because nobody knew who he was, because he was a little lost boy in the big bad world where Sue Grafton was the guest of honor.

That was Friday. By Sunday, he managed to turn that convention into Harlanfest. Some images stay with a person forever. I, for one, shall never forget Harlan and Robert Crais dancing together the night of the dance, even though Robert was too short for Harlan.

The next time I met Harlan Coben was on a bus ride to the authors' dinner at Magna Cum Murder in Muncie, Indiana. The shy and retiring Harlan was once again whining about nobody knowing who he was, but this did not stop him from entertaining the entire bus of dignitaries with the rather puny names of every pornographic movie made in the last ten years. We laughed, we cried, we wondered how he knew the names of these films.

When he was born and raised in New Jersey, who knew that this former political science major (aren't you supposed to go to law school?) and graduate of Amherst College (isn't that an all-woman's school?), would choose a career in the travel industry (i.e., airport porter). Needing an outlet for his creative energies (i.e., money), he turned to a career as a novelist.

His first book was entitled PLAY DEAD and evidently so did his career as a writer. Scour his web site, if you don't believe me. This long-lost child is not even mentioned. However, it did have a nice dust jacket photo. This was followed by MIRACLE CURE, which was not one for his sales. Again, not mentioned on the web site. However, Kirkus called it "lurid."

Harlan created a support team for his detective that includes some of the most interesting sidekicks in contemporary mysteries.

At this point in his marriage to his pediatrician wife Anne and after the birth of his three children, Charlotte, Benjamin and Will, the most common thing heard around

the Coben household was, "Why doesn't Daddy have to go to work like all the other Daddies?"

Then, a wiser person than he (his agent) suggested that he write about sports and be funny. And here is where I have to stop being funny myself, as a wonderful thing happened. Harlan developed Myron Bolitar, sports agent, detective, and all around nice guy. Harlan created a support team for his detective that includes some of the most sidekicks contemporary interesting in mysteries. Anyone who has read the series debates the qualities of Win. Everyone is attracted to Esperanza; who is not affected by Big Cindy? And don't we all wish we could still retreat to the comfort of our parents' house when things get bad.

Harlan's writing has advanced with the series, and he has matured along with his characters. Perhaps initially thought of as humorous mysteries, this series has developed into one that deals with deep and disturbing themes. Books in the series have won and been nominated for the Edgar Award, Shamus Award and Anthony Award, have been twice nominated for the Dilys Award, and a short story he wrote was nominated for the Anthony, Macavity and Agatha awards. Here are the titles so that if you don't have them, you can run to the dealer's room and buy them: DEAL BREAKER, DROPSHOT, FADE AWAY, BACK SPIN, ONE FALSE MOVE and THE FINAL DETAIL. Harlan's new book, DARKEST FEAR, will be out in June of this year.

All kidding aside, we are in the presence of a presence. I want to thank Harlan for writing his books, for sharing his sense of humor wherever he goes, and congratulate him on being Toastmaster of this Left Coast Crime Conference. You're awesome, baby!



loves, be they by his favorite authors What can we say about George Easter? Let's not use the old, worn cliché: you know, look in the dictionary for the word "nice" and you'll see his picture. We will say that one of the greatest pleasures of participating in mystery fandom is meeting wonderful people, and George Easter is an example of the best. In fact, he's so nice that it took two people to write this tribute!



George is an attorney by trade, but he no longer practices law. He and his wife, Michelle, publish a magazine from their home: Refunding Makes Sense. By all accounts, this is more than a full-time job for both George and Michelle.

Several years ago, George decided to publish a mystery magazine. He had been a reviewer for the now-defunct magazine, and he wanted to create a magazine for and by fans of the mystery field.

George sent out birth announcements for Deadly Pleasures and recruited some of the finest reviewers and critics around, such as Al Hubin, Marv Lachman, and the late Barry Gardner and Don Sandstrom. He also discovered some new talent, such as Gordy Magnuson, Russ Isabella and Maggie Mason (yes, that's us!).

Deadly Pleasures has evolved into one of the finest mystery magazines. In fact, at Bouchercon 1999 in Milwaukee, Deadly Pleasures was voted an Anthony Award for best non-fiction mystery publication. In true George fashion, while accepting the award he asked all attending contributors to stand and share this honor with him (though George did keep the plaque!).

George proves he is an innovator by creating such features as "Reviewed to Death" (one book each issue which is reviewed by all contributors to the magazine), and the "Quarterly Question" (a unique question for each issue about different aspects of the mystery genre and open to all readers' responses), thereby making Deadly Pleasures an interactive magazine.

We think those features are what set *Deadly Pleasures* apart from the rest and make it a force that welcomes participation from all readers. George spotlights a different mystery writer in each issue. Also, he has incorporated many other features such as:

- articles on collectible mysteries
- a British viewpoint (reviews of recent publications from the UK),
- a convention calendar,
- a running list of the best mysteries of the year, and
- a visit to Raymond Chandler's La Jolla, California by reader (and La Jolla Realtor) Nancy Mitchell, and more.

About three years ago, one of George's innovations for *Deadly Pleasures* was his creation of the Barry Awards. Named after Barry Gardner, the aforementioned contributor to *Deadly Pleasures* who so epitomized the heart of fandom in the mystery field, the Barry Award each year

honors new and established writers for the best works of the year, as voted by readers of *Deadly Pleasures*.

In his home state of Utah, George participates in a monthly mystery-readers' book club. To this dedicated group of avid readers, George brings his insider's knowledge of mysterydom, with all of the tales, history, and esoterica that only the true and loyal mystery fan--one with a library to kill for--could offer.

During a weak moment not long ago, George made an interesting decision. As if he weren't busy enough with his business, Deadly Pleasures, family, church, and community responsibilities, George decided to become a bookseller. He quickly has become a popular and honorable member of the book-selling ranks, selling via mail order and at mystery conventions, with the everpresent threat that he will be taking to the internet any day now. A quick look at Deadly Pleasures will tell you that George works hard to keep abreast of trends, both long-standing and quickly passing; he also hand sells the books he or promising upstarts.

There is so much more that could be said about George, but we find that much of it is too heart-felt to express. Left Coast Crime has made a wonderful choice for Fan Guest of Honor. If you haven't yet had the pleasure of meeting George, be sure to introduce yourself. You won't regret it, and you may just find yourself having a lot more fun. There are many of us proud to call George friend.

Alexander has written six historical mysteries featuring the real-life historical figure, Sir John Fielding, magistrate of the Bow Street Court during the latter half of the 18th Century. His most recent book was DEATH OF A COLONIAL.

Her protagonist is the first female "fire general" in the country to take charge of a federal command team.



REED ANDRUS was born and raised in Salt Lake City, a gentile in a family of Mormons. He took nine years to get undergraduate degrees in History and English, but four of those were spent in the Navy during Vietnam. He did post-grad work at the University of Cincinnati. Andrus and his wife, Chris, will celebrate 27 years together in June. They have one granddaughter. Andrus has been reviewing for *Mystery News* for 5-6 years, and he has pieces of three novels collecting dust until he can afford to retire.



DONNA ANDREWS is a self-confessed nerd, rarely found without her laptop. In her day job, she serves as website editor for a large corporation. MURDER WITH PEACOCKS, her first published novel, won the St. Martin's Press/Malice Domestic Best First Traditional Mystery contest in May 1998, and it is one of this year's Lefty Award nominees. Andrews now lives in Arlington, Virginia. MURDER WITH PUFFINS, the second in her series, will appear in May.



BURL BARER is an Edgar Award winner and two time Anthony Award nominee best known for THE SAINT, CAPTURE THE SAINT, and MAN OVERBOARD: The Counterfeit Resurrection of Phil Champagne. Forthcoming in 2000 is MURDER IN THE FAMILY (true crime) and HEADLOCK, the first entry in Barer's new "Jeff Reynolds, PI" series. Burl is also cute and amusing. Just ask him.



DAN BARTON is a professional stand-up comedian. He began his performing career while a student at the University of Texas. He then moved to Houston and began performing at the Comix Annex. After moving to Los Angeles, he concentrated on writing. The result was two suspense novels, BANSHEE and RELIFE. Upon returning to stand-up, Barton began to appear on such programs as A&E's "Evening at the Improv,", "Star Search," "Talk Soup" and "Live from Rascal's." He spent two years opening for the late Sam Kinison on his international concert tours. Barton has appeared in feature films, television programs, industrial videos and national commercials. He continues to perform regularly at the Comedy Store. KILLER MATERIAL is his first mystery.



LYNNETTE BAUGHMAN was born in Bremerton, Washington but grew up in Las Cruces, New Mexico. She is a graduate of New Mexico State University with a B.A. in English. She is married and the mother of three grown daughters. A former award winning newspaper editor, she is now freelancing and writing novels. A SPY WITHIN is her first novel.



JOHN BILLHEIMER, a native West Virginian, lives in Portola Valley, California. He holds an engineering doctorate from Stanford and is Vice President of SYSTAN, a small transportation planning firm. His first two novels, THE CONTRARY BLUES and HIGHWAY ROBBERY, tell the funny, sometimes touching stories of bus and highway scams gone wrong in the Appalachian coalfields.



ELEANOR TAYLOR BLAND has published eight novels in the Marti MacAlister series to date: DEAD TIME, SLOW BURN, GONE QUIET, DONE WRONG, SEE NO EVIL, TELL NO TALES, and SCREAM IN SILENCE. The ninth in this series, WHISPER THE DEAD, will be published in February 2001. Born in Boston, Bland now lives in Waukegan, Illinois. Born in Bath of an English father and Welsh mother, Bowen spent her childhood summers with relatives in a little village in North Wales, which later inspired her setting and eccentric characters. She studied at London University, as well as the Universities of Freiburg and Kiel before landing a job with BBC drama, where she began writing her own plays. Her American husband brought her to San Francisco, where they have raised four children. EVAN AND ELLE is her latest mystery.



PAULA BOYD has written for local and regional publications. Her novels have been winners in contests sponsored by Rocky Mountain Fiction Writers, Pikes Peak Writers Conference, Southwest Writers Conference and Authorlink. She recently received the RMFW Jasmine Award. Her debut mystery, Hot Enough to Kill, is set in a small Texas town, and Boyd declares, "As one might guess, I grew up in a small town in Texas. But that doesn't mean Kickapoo is my old hometown, nor is Readwater Falls the fictional equivalent of Wichita Falls. No, indeed. Both Holliday and Whichita Falls are fine and wondrous places full of really great people—lots of them my relatives. Consequently, no one should assume that any of the stuff I write about mirrors reality in any way. Nope, I made it all up. Really."



A professional educator for over twenty years, **KENT BRAITHWAITE** is an active member of the Mystery Writers of America, and his short fiction has appeared in a variety of mystery, sports and academic publications. His first novel, THE WONDERLAND MURDERS, stems from a variety of his life experiences. SUZANNE BRATCHER teaches writing and writing pedagogy at Northern Arizona University. She writes in a variety of genres, including non-fiction, poetry, mainstream fiction, and mystery fiction. She has published two books for elementary teachers on teaching children to write, and her articles have appeared in numerous professional publications. Her poetry and fiction have appeared in a variety of small-press publications. A recent story, "The Zucker Legacy," was chosen best of issue for the Fall, 1998 issue of *Mystery Time*.



STEVE BREWER is the creator of the comic Bubba Mabry private eye series. St. Martin's Press, simultaneously with the Intrigue Press paperback edition of an earlier Bubba book, WITCHY WOMAN, published the first book in this series, DIRTY POOL, in March. ROBIN BURCELL has been a police officer since 1983. She has been assigned to different details in the Investigations Division, working Crimes against Property, Persons, and Juvenile. She is a forensic artist, trained by the FBI at Quantico, Virginia. Currently she works patrol and is a member of the Hostage Negotiation Team for her department. She lives in Northern California with her husband and three children. EVERY MOVE SHE MAKES is her first police procedural thriller.

SANDRA LEVY CEREN, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist in Del Mar, California. She has appeared on *Oprah*, *Good Morning America*, local and national radio, TV and in print media. For the past thirty years, she has treated a wide range of patients, including crime victims. RECEPTION FOR TERROR is her debut novel. This psychological thriller introduces the first in a series featuring Dr. Cory Cohen, psychologist/sleuth.



LEE CHILD was born 45 years ago in England, and after law school he went to work as a television director, which kept him happy for 18 years, until he was downsized out of a job in 1995. So he became a writer, because entertainment was all he knew, and the "novel is the purest form of entertainment...the author is one-on-one with the reader, for hours and hours at a time." Child's first hovel, KILLING FLOOR, was an instant hit, winning the Anthony Award for Best First Novel in 1998 and the Barry Award. It was followed by DIE TRYING and TRIPWIRE, with RUNNING BLIND due in June 2000. All four books feature ex-US Army investigator Jack Reacher. Child moved from England to New York in 1998, where he is working on the fifth Reacher book heading for publication in 2001.





JOYCE CHRISTMAS is the author of 14 mysteries published by Fawcett Gold Medal, 10 featuring expatriate Brit in Manhattan, Lady Margaret Priam, who solves crimes in a society setting. Her most recent title is DYING WELL, to be published in June. Christmas' second series stars retired office manager and senior sleuth, Betty Trenka. The fourth in this series, MOOD FOR MURDER, was published last June. Her short stories have appeared in Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine; Malice Domestic V ("Takeout" was a Macavity nominee); Murder, They Wrote II; More Murder, They Wrote; and Women of Mystery II. Her profoundly moving recipe for Betty Trenka's Bean Soup appears in A TASTE OF MURDER.



MARK COGGINS earned two degrees and a Phi Beta Kappa key from Stanford University. He has worked for a number of Silicon Valley computer and venture capital firms, including Netscape Communications and three (other) software start-ups. Although THE IMMORTAL GAME is his first novel, he introduced the character of August Riordan in a short story titled "There's No Such Thing as Private Eyes" published in "The New Black Mask," vol. 4, Harcourt, Brace Jovanovich. He lives in San Francisco with his wife, Linda, and their cat, Taki.



DAVID COLE co-founded NativeWeb, an Internet corporation for Native Americans and indigenous peoples of the world. He spent twenty years in theatre as playwright, director, and lighting designer, and also worked as a Production/Technical Editor in business and education. BUTTERFLY LOST is his first novel. He lives in Syracuse, New York, with his wife and five cats, where he also teaches online courses about social issues and is building a harpsichord.



TESS COLLINS graduated from the University of Kentucky with a degree in journalism. She moved to San Francisco, where she became the Manager of the Curran Theater and wrote and produced a play, "Tossing Monte". Collins has written two novels, THE LAW OF REVENGE and THE LAW OF THE DEAD, featuring lawyer Alma Bashears. Collins claims that in about 50 years or so, she plans to retire, probably to the Appalachian Mountains.

His wife, Judy (a.k.a. "Judy"), when not engaged in her strenuous exercise program, patiently reads Bill's manuscripts and corrects his often flagrant grammatical errors. Their collaborative story "At the Hop" appears in the anthology TILL DEATH DO US PART edited by Jill Morgan.



DIANE MOTT DAVIDSON is the author of nine best-selling culinary mysteries, including PRIME CUT, THE GRILLING SEASON, and DYING FOR CHOCOLATE. She started writing in high school, but gave it up to study political science at Wellesley. Eventually Davidson transferred to and graduated from Stanford, and then went on to earn her M.A. in history of art at the Johns Hopkins University. After moving to Colorado, she became involved in raising a family and volunteer work. Davidson returned to writing in 1982, and in 1988 she sold her first novel, CATERING TO NOBODY. In 1990 she was named the Rocky Mountain Fiction Writers Writer of the Year. Davidson lives in Colorado with her husband and three sons and is working on the next Goldy the caterer novel.



SHARON DENNISON, who has written under the name of Shawna Delacorte, has lived most of her life in Los Angeles. Even though she earned her living for many years by working in television production, she's always been interested in writing. Her first published novel, SARAH AND THE STRANGER, was purchased by Silhouette, and Dennison received the Waldenbooks award for Best-selling Series Romance by a New Author. While temporarily residing in Kansas, Dennison plans to move to the Seattle area in the not-too-distant future. She currently is working on a mystery series.

He currently is working on the second book in this series, as well as a suspense novel set in Arizona.



DENISE DIETZ'S first two mysteries, THROW DARTS AT A CHEECAKE and BEAT UP A COOKIE, start a diet club leader/sleuth. FOOTPRINTS IN THE BUTTER – An Ingrid Beaumont Mystery co-starring Hitchcock the Dog – was #8 on the Barnes & Nobel (epub) bestseller list before it was print-published by Delphi Books. Other novels include THE RAINBOW'S FOOT, DREAM DANCER, PROMISES TO KEEP, and THE LANDLORD'S BLACK-EYED DAUGHTER. Dietz lives in Colorado Springs, where she gains inspiration from the majestic mountains and her beloved Denver Broncos.



MICHAEL ALLEN DYMMOCH, who has degrees in chemistry and law enforcement, lives and works in Chicago's northern suburbs. Dymmoch has served as President of the Midwest chapter of Mystery Writers of America, and is newsletter editor for the Chicagoland chapter of Sisters in Crime. THE MAN WHO UNDERSTOOD CATS, the first novel featuring Chicago police detective John Thinnes and psychiatrist Jack Caleb, won the St. Martin's Press Malice Domestic Award for Best First Traditional Mystery and received enthusiastic reviews from The New York Times Book Review, Kirkus Reviews, and Publisher's Weekly. INCENDIARY DESIGNS, Dymmoch's third book, has been favorably reviewed also.



LISA ELFRING is a biology educator/adjunct lecturer in the Department of Biochemistry at the University of Arizona. She coordinates a master's degree program for biology teachers and teaches courses on how to use biology laboratories as effective teaching tools. She received her Ph.D. from the University of California, Santa Cruz, in Cell and Molecular Biology and went on to do postdoctoral research on genes that control embryonic development at the Whitehead Institute for Biomedical Research, a private institute affiliated with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. She decided nearly three years ago to change her professional focus to science education, and feels fortunate to have found a position in science education that allowed her to move back to the West.

EDWARD D. HOCH is a past-president of Mystery Writers of America and winner of its Edgar Award for best short story in 1968. He has published over 800 short stories and nearly 50 novels, collections and anthologies, with stories appearing in every issue of Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine since 1973. For twenty years he edited The Year's Best Mystery and Suspense Stories and is active in professional and fan organizations. In 1991 he was Guest of Honor at the annual Bouchercon convention of mystery writers and fans, and in 1998 he received the conventions Anthony Award for Best Short Story. STAN JONES was born and lives in Anchorage, Alaska. An environmentalist and prize-winning journalist, he also is a bush pilot and has flown all over northwest Alaska. Jones introduced his protagonist Alaskan State Trooper Nathan Active in WHITE SKY, BLACK ICE.



CHRISTINE T. JORGENSEN writes the humorous Stella the Stargazer series featuring Stella, the quirky, star-crossed author of an astrological columnist for the lovelorn in the Denver weekly paper, the Denver Daily Orion. The series includes A LOVE TO DIE FOR, YOU BET YOUR LIFE, CURL UP AND DIE, DEATH OF A DUSTBUNNY and DEAD ON HER FEET. A Denver resident for thirty years, Jorgensen hails from a small town in the mid-west. Jorgensen's day job for more than twenty-five years was as a social worker, primarily in the field of child protection and pediatric rehabilitation.



LARRY KARP, a long-time collector and amateur restorer of antique music boxes, drew on his experience in writing THE MUSIC BOX MURDERS, the first book in a series featuring amateur sleuth Thomas Purdue. The second Purdue adventure, SCAMMING THE BIRDMAN, is due out this March. Karp received the 1997 Bowers Literary Award for "outstanding literary contributions to the field of automatic music" from the Musical Box Society International. A former physician, Karp founded and directed the Prenatal Diagnosis Center at the University of Washington, and the Department of Perinatal Medicine at Swedish Medical Center, Seattle. He's presently at work on the third Purdue mystery, provisionally titled THE MIDNIGHT SPECIAL.



CAROL MCGINNIS KAY is a recovering administrator and currently Professor of English at the University of South Carolina. Named by noted *L.A. Times* mystery reviewer Charles Champlin a7s one of ten women writing "superior crime fiction," **ROCHELLE KRICH** won the Anthony Award for her first suspense novel, WHERE'S MOMMY NOW?, which was filmed as "Perfect Alibi" with Teri Garr, Kathleen Quinlan, and Hector Elizondo. Her stand-alone mysteries include TILL DEATH DO US PART, NOWHERE TO RUN, SPEAK NO EVIL, and FERTILE GROUND. Her series character, LAPD Detective Jessica Drake, debuted in FAIR GAME and returned in ANGEL OF DEATH. Both novels were nominated for the Agatha. The fourth Jessie Drake mystery, DEAD AIR, will be published in March, 2000. Krich is working currently on another Jessie Drake mystery for Avon, tentatively titled WAYWARD SON.



KEN KUHLKEN'S first novel, MIDHEAVEN, was honored as a finalist for PEN's Ernest Hemingway Award for best first-published fiction book of the year. His second novel, THE LOUD ADIOS, the first of a series that begins in the 1940s, won the St. Martin's /PWA Best First Novel award. The next two books in the series are THE VENUS DEAL and THE ANGEL GANG, both from St. Martin's. Since earning a Master of Fine Arts degree in fiction from the University of Iowa in 1978, Kuhlken has taught creative writing and literature at San Diego State University, The University of Arizona, California State University at Chico, University of San Diego and Southwestern College. ROBERT S. LEVINSON has spent years as a newspaperman, public relations executive, and television writer-producer. He draws upon experience gained in these areas in his first novel, THE ELVIS AND MARILYN AFFAIR, that introduced Los Angeles newspaper columnist Neil Guilliver and his actress ex-wife Stevie Marriner. Levinson presently is at work on his third Neil and Stevie book, which he says has a working title of THE HARRY POTTER AFFAIR. ("It was either that or THE 2001 AFFAIR: A SPACE ODYSSEY," he says.) BILL MOODY grew up in southern California but now lives near San Francisco. After four years in the Air Force, he studied at Berklee College of Music in Boston, where he was literally plucked from the classroom to join pianist Jr. Mance and legendary singer Jimmy Rushing. Moody went on to join singer Lou Rawls, and then later, pianist Earl Fatha Hines. SOLO HAND, the first in his series featuring jazz pianist-sleuth Evan Horne, was followed by DEATH OF A TENON MAN, THE SOUND OF THE TRUMPET and BIRD LIVES! A professional jazz drummer and noted critic, Moody also teaches creative writing at Sonoma State University.



KRIS NERI is the author of over forty mystery short stories, published in such notable publications as *Blue Murder Magazine, Mystery Time, Murderous Intent, TheCase.com*, and *Woman's World*, to name a few. She is a two-time recipient of the Coveted Derringer Award. She is a member of the Mystery Writers of America, the American Crime Writers League, as well as a member of Sisters In Crime and a past president of the Los Angeles Chapter. She lives in Southern California, where she is currently working on DEM BONES' REVENGE, the second in her Tracy Eaton mystery series that debuted with REVENGE OF THE GYPSY QUEEN.



MICHAEL NEWTON has published 146 books since 1977, with 15 more pending release from various publishers through the year 2001. Although most of his work has been fiction, with novels published under his own and various pen names, Newton is best know for his work in true-crime, specifically the subject areas of serial murder, cults, and terrorism. This work was nominated for an Anthony Award as one of the best reference books of 1993 at the Bouchercon World Mystery Conference held in Seattle in 1994. Niebuhr operates P.I.E.S. (Private Investigator Entertainment Service), a mail order catalog of new and used private eye fiction, and a publishing effort under the My Books imprint.



MAXINE O'CALLAGHAN writes novels of mystery and dark suspense. Her Delilah West series has been credited by many critics as being the first of the new female private investigators. O'Callaghan began her writing career twenty-five years ago after her two children were in school, and she sold the first short story she submitted to Alfred Hitchcock's Mystery Magazine. Her last novel, DOWN FOR THE COUNT, was nominated for the Shamus Award. A lecturer on college campuses, she's written and edited essays, reports, and technical papers dealing with environmental issues, social change, and contemporary printmaking.



T. JEFFERSON PARKER has written LAGUNA HEAT, RED LIGHT, THE BLUE HOUR, WHERE SERPENTS LIE, and THE TRIGGERMAN'S DANCE.



With over 6 million copies of his work in print, RIDLEY PEARSON is the best-selling author of eleven novels, including BEYOND RECOGNITION, CHAIN OF EVIDENCE, PROBABLE CAUSE and UNDERCURRENTS. He was the first American to be awarded the Raymond Chandler/Fulbright Fellowship in detective fiction at Oxford University. He lives with his wife and daughter in the Northwest.



JOANNE PENCE was born and raised in San Francisco, the setting for her Angie Amalfi mystery series. A graduate of U. C. Berkeley with a master's degree in journalism, Pence has taught school in Japan, written for magazines, and worked as an operations analysis manager. Pence's background, as well as her Italian and Spanish heritage, are reflected in her critically acclaimed, award-winning mystery series featuring an underemployed journalist/gourmet cook and a San Francisco homicide inspector. Pence now lives north of San Francisco with her husband, two sons, three cats and a golden retriever. She is not a gourmet cook.



GARY PHILLIPS was born in South-Central Los Angeles and started writing when he was in his teens. He is the author of the crime novels VIOLENT SPRING, Perdition, U.S.A., and BAD NIGHT IS FALLING, which revolve around black detective Ivan Monk. J. R. RIPLEY, author of the Tony Kozol mystery series (STIFF IN THE FREEZER and SKULLS OF SEDONA), is also the author of the Big Deal series of chapter books for children, written as Glenn Meganck.



LORA ROBERTS has spent the last few years writing about Liz Sullivan, who also lives in Palo Alto, California and tries to make a living from writing. Liz's fictional life, however, is much more exciting than Lora's real life. Liz has a dog, an old VW bus, and the need to work at temp jobs every so often to replenish her coffers. 



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
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Literacy Volunteers of Tucson

Literacy Volunteers of Tucson (LVT) trains volunteer tutors to teach people to read, write and speak English. Their mission is to provide this free service so those at the lowest levels of literacy can achieve their goals in life. LVT was founded in 1961 and is an affiliate of two parent organizations, Literacy Volunteers of America and Laubach Literacy Action.

How LVT Works at 1 and growing to benefiting at flive rebruses my of to be realistic.

LVT tutors complete training workshops and teach at 60 locations in and around Tucson. Supervised literacy centers and other tutoring locations are in schools, churches, libraries and service agencies. Volunteers tutor in basic literacy and teach English to speakers of other languages, pre-GED subjects, and for citizenship preparation. This is done one-on-one and in small groups. LVT served 900 adult learners last year with 290 trained volunteers, involving 19,000 volunteer hours. LVT also provides tutors for the Head Start program, so that parents get tutoring during their children's class time.

LVT receives funding in part from an Arizona Department of Adult Education grant, but most of their funding comes from individual contributions, corporate and service organization support, special events, and other fundraising efforts.

Illiteracy is Our Problem

With LTV's help, many adult learners have made great strides, but the need for literacy help is overwhelming. In Pima County, nearly 20% of adults who are native English speakers are functionally illiterate. In Tucson, 27% of the population 5 years and older cannot speak English. Illiteracy is a problem we cannot see, but it's at the root of societal conditions we do see: unemployment, underemployment, crime, and poverty. Literacy empowers people to better their lives and the lives of their families.

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


It's too dark.
