
good wine and stimulating conversation. She is well-read, both within the genre and beyond it, and maintains a former journalist's awareness of current events. She has a sense of humor that is utterly addictive.

She is someone who will identify a need in her community and then begin to work for change from within her immediate environment—herself,

her home, her neighborhood. She's not the person who does a bit of charitable work on Thanksgiving and then wishes everyone good luck until next year. She's the one who is there all the other weeks. At the founding of the Crime Lab Project, she was among the first to say "yes," and she made good on her commitment to help us educate others.

Guest of Honor: Craig Johnson

I READ CRAIG JOHNSON'S FIRST NOVEL The Cold Dish when it was on submission from the agent Gail Hochman nearly ten years ago and I knew immediately that I had something special on my hands. But what did I know about the American West as an English woman who had come to New

York in 1976? Perhaps I'd seen too many episodes of "The Lone Ranger" when I was a child! What I loved about Craig was his ability to combine my romantic notions of the American West with a down-to-earth sensibility that kept his stories and characters utterly modern. Sheriff Walt Longmire of Absaroka County is the embodiment of the honorable and tough men that the West is known for, but he can also quote Dante, grieve deeply for his late wife, wring his hands over his only daughter, and manage to joke about it all with his signature wry humor.

But it's not just Walt that we admire. We keep coming back to Craig's books for his

terrific writing, unique plots and the whole host of diverse and very real characters that he has created, from the tough, taciturn and ever loyal Henry Standing Bear to sassy Philadelphia-import Victoria Moretti to Walt's leathery predecessor Lucian Connally, and many more.

Craig's seventh book in the series, Hell Is Empty, hit the New York Times bestseller list, as did his eighth book As the Crow Flies. After we

had published seven Longmire mysteries, the series attracted the attention of A&E and the books have now been adapted for television in A&E's hit drama series, *Longmire*, starring Robert Taylor as the Sheriff, and with Lou Diamond Phillips as Henry Standing Bear and

Katee Sackhoff as Victoria Moretti.

No author deserves such success more than Craig. He is a man with an amazing work ethic, always responsive to his publisher's requests-something that sadly can't be said for all authors! And it's not just about writing. Ably supported by his wife, Judy, Craig is always working, whether it's writing a newsletter for his fans or going on the road for months, not only doing the fifteen to twenty events his publicist sets up for him, but adding another fifteen to twenty on what we now dub "Craig's great motorcycle

tour." Craig is a man of the West himself, from his ten-gallon hat to the cowboy code of honor by which he lives, to his great, big American heart. I couldn't wish for a better author.

Fan Guests of Honor: Tom & Enid Schantz

Almost everybody in the mystery world has made one important stop on their way to fame, and that stop was the bookstore on the Boulder mall known as Rue Morgue.

The proprietors of said bookstore are ubiquitous, and were pretty much

known by the name Tom&Enid, irretrievably linked. Left Coast Crime would probably not exist if not for Tom and Enid, and probably it's because of their role in starting the conference that it took such a long time for them to be recognized as Fan Guests of Honor. We're sorry that it didn't happen sooner, but that's tempered by the fact that it happened in time for Enid to



know it.

After marrying and fleeing the Iowa Writers Workshop in 1969, Tom and Enid Schantz started their bookstore, then called the Aspen Bookhouse (anticipating a move back to Colorado) in upstate New York, specializing in mysteries. In the late 1970s they changed the name to The Rue Morgue, and opened a brick and mortar store in downtown Boulder in 1980, which they operated until selling it in 2000. Since then they have been issuing catalogs of mysteries designed to appeal to lovers of traditional, historical and literary mysteries.

They began publishing mysteries, mostly Sherlockian and detective short stories, in 1973 as the Aspen Press. In 1997, they launched The Rue Morgue Press, which has so far reprinted more than 150 classic mystery novels. They hosted Left Coast Crime in 1996 in Boulder, Bouchercon in Denver in 2000, and two Historicons, a convention devoted to the historical mystery, in the 1990s in Boulder. Until Enid's death in August 2011 they were a fixture in the bookrooms of most major mystery conventions. Tom is a permanent member of the Left Coast Crime mystery convention. Tom and Enid received a Raven from the Mystery Writers of America in 2001.

When the Left Coast Crime committee asked people if they had a memory of Enid or Tom (or Tom & Enid) that they'd like to contribute, the memories flooded in. And here they are:

Back in 1989 when the idea of The Poisoned Pen was forming, my husband Rob and I stopped in at the Rue Morgue in downtown Boulder. The warm welcome, the vision, ideas, and in fact tutelage we received made all the difference. Tom and Enid were, and Tom remains, a treasury packed with resources for readers and the whole publishing community. They were in the group who formed The Independent Mystery Booksellers Association and created The Dilys Award, started and advanced the careers of many authors, and through Rue Morgue Press brought back into print a host of wonderful books. Rob and I only wish that Enid were able to be at the celebration honoring their myriad contributions to us all.

Tom and Enid will be forever etched in my mind as the personification of the mystery book world we inhabit. I seem to remember them at every conference I attended, always with a smile and a kind word. You couldn't find a more

Tom and Enid will always have a fond spot in my heart for hosting the 1996 Left Coast Crime in Boulder, Colorado, and inviting Kinky Friedman to be the Guest of Honor. The result was the Left Coast Crime Cabaret, headlined by the Kinkster himself, and featuring several mystery authors. I wrote Signing in the Waldenbooks on the airplane on the way to that convention, and debuted it at the cabaret. I have been singing it at conventions ever since, and I am happy to include a recording of it on the Last Resort Troubadour CD. *Parnell Hall*

I was lucky enough to win the Lefty at the Left Coast Crime held in 1995 in Boulder. At the time there was no established Lefty plaque or trophy. I am pleased to say that part of Enid will always be with me as it was her left hand imprint that was used in the making of the plaque that was awarded to me. Enid had a small hand but a big heart. When I got my first mystery published, Who's Susan?, I attended my first writing conference in Dallas. Tom and Enid were there. I felt completely lost and overwhelmed. I had no

idea what I was doing or even how. Tom and Enid took me under their wings and helped paved the road. I will always be grateful to them for that. L. C. Hayden

Tom & Enid are the most wonderful booksellers, and I still recall the "dark and stormy night" that I'd had to battle the elements, flying through terrible storms to reach my old stomping ground, Colorado. Unbelievable as it may be, despite the weather, they had a turnout of so many people in their small, cozy, comforting store that I found about ten former friends who wanted to go have hot soup and wine with me afterwards! So what had begun for me in the east as a combat-zone book tour ended up as Old Home Week in Colorado - thanks to them! Katherine Neville

I first met them in person in the book dealers room at a Bouchercon. At the Chicago Bouchercon, I interrupted Dana Stabenow railing to poor Tom about people not wanting to attend the Anchorage Bouchercon because they think it's too cold. I'm normally quite quiet and reticent but I felt so sorry for Tom. Besides, I had books to buy, doncha know. Tom and Enid were always gracious. As booksellers, they supported those of us from independent presses and, as publishers, kept alive the out-of-print classics. They are classic themselves, and I am grateful for all they have done for the writer/reader community. *Priscilla Royal*

Tom and Enid were aways incredibly gracious to me at each conference where we met. Not just in terms of agreeing to sell books on consignment -- but as friends and advisors, always willing to answer questions and talk about books in general. Both have made a great impact on our community. Neil Plakcy

I didn't know Tom and Enid well on a personal level, but I've been attending mystery conventions for nearly 20 years, and their presence was a constant over that time. I have no idea how many times I heard a "new to me" author, then ran

to the book room to find the book. Tom and Enid usually had what I wanted. I will miss Enid's familiar face and friendliness as she took care of the sale. Suzanne Epstein

Tom and Enid introduced me to readers that would never have heard of me, and they did the small things for their instore events that made me feel important, such as special signs and banners, even when I obviously did not deserve such attention. They hosted my first ever reading and signing for my debut novel, and were always there for each book afterwards until they sold the brick-and-mortar Rue Morgue. Their support, encouragement, and humor never flagged and I always felt at home in their shop. Thank you, muchisimas gracias, Tom and Enid. Those were great times with great people. *Manuel Ramos*

While attending a conference in Denver I convinced one of the attendees with a car that we needed to go to Boulder. My motive was to visit a mystery book store that I read about. My friends dropped me off at Rue Morgue. Enid was the only one there and I spent a delightful hour talking mysteries. I have attended Bouchercon since 1986 and Enid was always so gracious and she always recommended new authors to me. . . . 

Toastmaster: David Corbett

One of the perks of being a writer is the occasional free meal courtesy of your publisher. I first met David at a such a dinner thrown by our mutual publisher in conjunction with Bouchercon, and of the writers at the table on that particular outing, David made the biggest impression. It's immedi-

ately obvious that he's a force. He's a big guy, with a big voice (more about that later) and a big heart.

His first book, The Devil's Redhead, had been out for less than a year and had been nominated for the Anthony and Barry awards for best first novel. and his second one, Done for a Dime, was poised to come out the next year. Over the course of this dinner he was funny, irreverent, generous, outlandish, and at times a little melancholy. He was still mourning the death of his wife Terri and didn't care who knew it. He had spent many years working as an actual PI, first for a large firm, and then in conjunction with his wife's law practice. He had done a stint as a waiter. As a PI, he had investigated

some high-profile cases, including the first Michael Jackson child molestation trial. He thought Scott Phillips's *The Ice Harvest* should have won the Edgar for best first novel that year, and I don't think he just said that because Scott was there, too.

I hadn't read *The Devil's Redhead*, but I bought it and became a big fan. You know how sometimes a writer impresses you in person but his books disappoint? Not the case with David Corbett. His written work is just as passionate as he is in

person, just as literate, with perfect timing. Only maybe not quite as loud.

Mean streets: He writes them with authenticity because he's been there. Dirty jobs: he's been there. Musician and stand-up comic? He's been there. In fact he has a real writer's resume—flight

from the midwest to the coast, rejection of graduate study in linguistics (good call, David!), paying his dues, and living an interesting life.


Reviewers have compared his published work to various literary greats, in case you need a frame reference: Graham Greene, Dashiel Hammett. His books have the qualities that appeal to readers-action. male low-down douthrills. ble-dealing, strong male characters. But they also have characteristics that endear them to womentenderness, romance, loyalty, strong female characters. And of course the qualities that appeal to all readers, a damn good story.

Oh, I said there would be more about the big

voice. We ended the publisher's dinner with David leading the group (well, those of us who remembered the words, I think two of us) in singing some show tunes and a few selections by Tom Lehrer. He knew *all* the words and, unlike everybody else at the table he could actually sing.

As the Left Coast Crime toastmaster, he may not even need a microphone.




Troubador: Parnell Hall

PARNELL HALL IS THE KING OF KINDLE—or at least he aspires to be King. Mary Higgins Clark wants to be Queen. Don't believe me, visit his website and watch the video!

So what or who else is Parnell Hall?

He is a penny ante gambler, who bets a mean sugar packet when there's nothing else to play with. He's an ex-PI, an actor, a singer and songwriter-hence his title, The Last Resort Troubadour. He kicked off his singing career at sixteen, but made Left Coast Crime headlines in 1996 by singing his hit single "Signing at the Waldenbooks and Nobody's There" at the Kinky Friedman show on Saturday night. Parnell had arrived in Boulder, ink wet on the lyrics in hand and performed it live to a cheering audience. Since then he has written at least two more songs expressly for Left Coast Crime. The "Ode to Alferd E. Packer," Colorado's most notorious cannibal, was debuted at Left Coast Crime 2008. This year he will unveil "The Last Resort."



Still, Parnell is much more than a once-was PI, a once-was actor, and a so-so gambler with a good voice and a pretty face. He is the bestselling author of the Puzzle Lady crossword puzzle mysteries, the Stanley Hastings mystery novels, and the Steve Winslow courtroom dramas.

He and Cora Felton, the Puzzle Lady, have a lot in common. Cora lives in Connecticut (Parnell doesn't) and has a nationally syndicated crossword puzzle column (Parnell doesn't). But Cora couldn't construct a puzzle if her life depended on it. Her niece Sherry Carter writes the column for her. The much married Miss Felton is much happier solving crime. Common ground! As research for the Puzzle Lady books, Parnell competed in the National Crossword Puzzle Tournament in Stamford, Connecticut. Out of a field of 254 contestants, he finished 250th, just ahead of the four people who failed to turn in a paper. Cora made her debut in 1999 in A Clue for the Puzzle Lady and romped through thirteen books. Number fourteen in the series, Arsenic and Old Puzzles, hit the stands in January.

Parnell worked for two years as a private detective in NYC, and drew from his own experience writing his Stanley Hastings series. The first book in the series, *Detective*, published in 1987, was nominated for an Edgar award by the Mystery Writers of America and a Shamus award by the Private Eye Writers of America. His eighteenth Stanley Hastings novel, *Stakeout*, was released in January.

He also wrote five books in the Steve Winslow courtroom drama series under the pseudonym J.P. Hailey. With no courtroom experience, he claims he "owes the series to a childhood spent





reading Erle Stanley Gardner." Parnell is a member of the Writers Guild of America East and has several screenplays to his credit, including the underground horror movie *C.H.U.D.*, which has been satirized on *Saturday Night Live*, The Simpsons, Pushing Daisies, The Dailey Show and The Colbert Report.

Without a doubt, Parnell Hall is a talented man. But there is one thing that defines him. Humor. Parnell Hall is a funny guy. I'm not sure if he's the King of Kindle, but he's definitely a King of Comedy. More importantly, he's the one and only Last Resort Troubadour. Hats off, and bow.







Ghost of Honor: Stephen J. Cannell

Anyone who grew up watching TV in the 1970s, 80s or 90s and loved detective series and action shows, no doubt watched something scripted by Stephen J. Cannell. Throughout his TV career, Cannell scripted more than 450 episodes and produced more than 1,500 episodes.

A staggering number, this takes on even more significance because Stephen was born with dyslexia. It's something he shared in common with several of my children. Knowing he was an avid spokesperson and advocate for children and adults with learning disabilities, I took my daughter Mardee to meet him in 1997. Stephen was scheduled to speak at the Tattered Cover. Mardee was twelve and had been struggling in school. That night, Stephen gave us a magical gift. He gave us his undivided attention for forty-five minutes, minutes that changed my daughter's outlook on life. He told her to follow her dreams, and he backed it up with his own story.

Stephen J. Cannell was born in 1941. He struggled with dyslexia throughout his schooling. He was held back several grades. Yet, he listed "author" as his future career in his high school yearbook and his favorite subject was English. Also told his was an impossible dream, he eventually graduated from the University of Oregon with a degree in journalism.

After college, he worked for his father's business during the day and wrote every night, churning out television spec scripts. It took five years, but his persistence paid off. In an ironic twist, I learned it was my uncle Stanley Kallis, executive producer of Mission Impossible, who bought Stephen's first script giving him his first big break. He then sold another script to It Takes a Thief and landed his first staff job as the



story editor of Adam-12. By age 29, he had become one of the youngest executive producers at Universal Studios. It was there that Stephen wrote a pilot called The Rockford Files. He claimed that the networks "hated" the concept because it broke the mold of the tough-as-nails private detective stereotype by featuring a cantankerous PI who would drop a case if it got too rough. After James Garner committed to playing Rockford, NBC picked up the series and the pilot tested with the highest score in NBC history. Fueled by this success, Cannell went on to create more hit series such as Baretta and Baa Baa Black Sheep, connecting with TV audiences by creating flawed heroes who were quirky

and street smart. He left Universal in 1979 to form Stephen J. Cannell Productions. A gutsy move, but with faith in his own talent the list of hits he wrote include: Tenspeed and Brown Shoe, The Greatest American Hero, The A-Team, Hunter, Riptide, Hardcastle and McCormick, The Commish, Silk Stalkings and 21 Jumpstreet.

Seven years later, Stephen formed The Cannell Studios. Having surpassed the \$1 billion mark in production outlays, the studio experienced remarkable growth and diversification. In 1989, Cannell developed the North Shore Studios, at the time, the largest feature film and television studio in Canada. Stephen had redefined the definition of the television writer by becoming the third biggest television producer, with multiple shows on several networks. Cannell Studios still owns the worldwide distribution rights to more than 1,000 hours of Cannell-produced series and TV movies.

By the mid-1990s, broadcasting had changed. Stephen decided it was time to follow his dream of becoming a novelist. Segueing into the world of print, he wrote sixteen bestselling mystery novels, including a number of standalones and the critically acclaimed Shane Scully series. The winner of numerous awards for his television career, in 2005 Stephen received The Marlow Lifetime Achievement Award for his body of work from Mystery Writers of America. Stephen died from melanoma in 2010. He was 69.

My mother told me that when someone passes, that person lives on in the hearts of those who remember them. I remember Stephen with a special fondness. That evening at the Tattered Cover in Cherry Creek was a turning point for Mardee. By the time we drove away, Mardee viewed herself differently. She no longer saw a person with a disability, but rather a person who learns differently. Someone who approaches the world in a different way. She no longer saw her limitations, but rather saw her potential and value. Like Stephen, my daughter has gone on to achieve great things, including earning a master's degree.

The legacy of Stephen J. Cannell is his collection of work. It's a testament to his creative ability. But it is through children like Mardee, whose lives he touched, that Stephen lives on. It is in the hearts of parents, like me.






prepare that particular meal.
