Praising Cain


f you're not careful, Chelsea Cain might kill you. She may even *Kill You Twice*, even if she is Portland's crime-writing *Sweetheart*. All it would take is *One*

Kick. But for all the grisly deaths, seductive serial killers, scarred-in-moreways-than-one detectives, and kidnapped young women righting the world's wrongs in Cain's two series, you know what you won't find? Bad puns. I take full responsibility for those. Cain's humor is as darkly original as her plots. And it's wonderful. It doesn't get nearly enough credit. There aren't many writers who can reliably make you laugh and recoil in horror in the space of a page. Cain belongs in this select group.

Don't let your chuckling lull you into a false sense of security, though.

Organs will be ripped out. Corpses will be displayed on prominent Portland landmarks. Numerous characters will be tortured. The body toll after seven books will be substantial. In short, be prepared for physical and psychological carnage. Cain's long-running series, after all, does feature serial killer Gretchen Lowell as a main character (and even crime fiction novices know that murder doesn't land one in a cushy minimum security prison). If your first introduction to Chelsea Cain is seeing her name in the preceding paragraph of this essay, stop reading now. No,

seriously. Stop. Head straight to the Book Room. Or, if you're up for a field trip, get your coat—you're in Portland so it's probably raining—and walk, drive, or

bike (remember the Portland thing?) to the nearest bookstore and pick up a copy of *Heartsick* and *One Kick*. If you're a digital devotee and/or you're currently sitting in the audience at Left Coast Crime in Portland waiting for a panel to start, it's perfectly acceptable to buy both—yes, both—titles for your Kindle or other e-reader.


Heartsick introduces readers to troubled Portland cop Archie Sheridan who's back on the job after being tortured and then released by Gretchen Lowell, a serial killer he tracked with the rest of the Beauty Killer task force. Dearest Gretchen is


easy on your eyes, until she gouges them out with a scalpel in a rest stop bathroom and carves a heart in your chest. Or something equally romantic. It's the complicated relationship between Archie, Gretchen, and reporter Susan Ward that mutates and evolves over the course of six books—so far—that keeps readers coming back. It's also the reason to read the series in order. That and to keep an accurate record of all the shades of Manic Panic that Susan dyes her hair.

For all of you who just read about Gretchen Lowell's penchant for

knives and thought, "well, thanks, I'll never sleep again," One Kick is for you. 21-year-old Kick Lannigan, as her name implies, kicks ass. Kidnapped at age six and rescued at 11, Kick is not a vigilante. She does, however, help missing kids, thanks to her impressive skill set, which isn't kind one learns from the Common Core in college. Equally handy with knives and guns, Kick can pick locks—including handcuffs—and break out of a car trunk. Reliable sources tell me that it is much more difficult to pick a set of handcuffs with a bent paper clip than it looks, especially compared to the how-to guides available online.

And by "reliable sources," I mean me. I should really wait to pitch this to a TV executive eager for the next hot reality program but Cain and I attempted, for over an hour, to un-cuff ourselves in her home office, using a variety of paper clips, the Internet, and the relevant passages from One Kick. We were not successful. Neither was her daughter, but she was nine at the time; now that she's 10 it seems only fair that she gets another shot. Luckily, the handcuffs—police-issue courtesy of the Internet—came with two keys, in addition to the bag of universal handcuff keys Cain had purchased for an upcoming Kick event. How many other authors do you know who have universal handcuff keys just lying around? I suggested we try escaping from her car trunk but Cain patiently pointed out that it wouldn't be much of a challenge in a







Prius. This cunning insight is clearly one of the many reasons why she is a *New York Times* bestselling author (and I am not).

But I'm not Chelsea Cain's publicist. My job doesn't depend on whether or not a certain percentage of you buy her books. Perhaps this will mean more because no one is making me say it: I genuinely hope you read *Heartsick* and keep going straight through until Let Me Go. You can mourn the temporary loss of Archie, Susan, and Gretchen in the time it takes for you to put down Go and pick up One Kick, and then fall in love all over again with Kick Lannigan. If you pace yourself, you may not have to wait too long for a new installment: rumor has it Kick #2 is on the horizon later this year.

Are you still undecided? Do you need more in the "Cain is Cool" column? Not to get too alliterative but here are some things Chelsea Cain champions: corgis (she has one, plus a Boston Terrier, who's very cute); comics (she reads them); Converse (she rocks them); Criminal Intent (of the Law & Order variety, which she watches); cinema (she watches it, too, along with husband Marc Mohan, who's a film critic for *The Oregonian*); and, of course, crime (she doesn't commit it but she probably knows more about it than you do). Above all, Cain is one of the coolest, funniest, most generous people I know. She's also the first person I'll call if I ever find a body.

Conversations with Timothy Hallinan

Brett Battles

For a while, Tim Hallinan and I both wrote at the aptly named Novel Café in Santa Monica. I never saw Tim write when he wasn't wearing headphones. Often, he'd be drumming on the table, and mouthing the words. When I was asked to interview him, I knew that was what I want to ask about.

Brett Battles: Do you always listen to music as you write?

Hallinan: Almost. The exceptions are the days when the scene has already written itself in my head and I have to get it down before I forget it. Otherwise, there's always some playlist cranking as I work.

writing is stronger than my anxiety about writing, and it forces me to get to work. Music lessens that, and occasionally the music and the words become one thing, and I can write for quite a while with no anxiety at all. That happens without music, too, but not often.

Finally, like coffee, music supplies energy. For those stretches in which the story is moving along, what I want is just good, reliable energy, which I get from rock and roll and country. Keeps the mind open and the words flowing.


It almost seems like you create a soundtrack for every

book you write. Is that how you feel about it?

I sometimes try to match the music to the writing. An example: I've obviously never had the experience of being a woman. Fortunately, popular music


is full of amazing women who write and perform their own work, so I get not only the female perspective, but also their spirit and emotions.

And then there's mood. Right now I'm in the middle of a dark suspense scene that will open the final act of *King*



What does music do for your writing?

It builds a bell jar in which it's just me, the music, the story, and the keyboard. Writing isn't that different



from dreaming, and music can provide a soundtrack for the day's dream.


It also helps me manage anxiety.
I have a certain amount of permanent anxiety when I'm writing. My "writing routine" is essentially waiting each day until my anxiety about not

Maybe, the fifth Junior Bender book, and I'm using Beethoven's late string quartets, which are full of dissonance and dynamic shakeups.

Do you have certain go-to artists? Who are they and what draws you to them over and over?

Dylan, especially the middle period from "Blonde On Blonde" through the beginning of the "born again" era. He was surfing a creative tsunami of creativity at that point. I've written probably 70 or 80 pages to his 8-9 minute masterpiece of undependable narrative, "Brownsville Girl."

Brett Battles counts among his favorite writers Haruki Murakami, Stephen King, Graham Greene, and Timothy Hallinan. He writes thrillers, telling stories of espionage, the every man hero, post-apocalyptical survival, and time travel...so far. He loves telling stories,



and could not be happier that he's able to do it full time. His new Quinn thriller, The Buried, will be out later this month.

Bruce DeSilva

Bruce DeSilva: You have two series going, one featuring an American journalist in Bangkok, and the other a Los Angeles burglar. How do you manage two books a year and remain sane—or am I making a false assumption?

Hallinan: It's a false assumption. I missed the deadline for the 2013

Rafferty book, For the Dead. I actually live chin-deep in a freezing tidepool of anxiety.

The Rafferty novels are dark and literary. The Bender novels verge on slapstick-noir. How can you be two different writers at the same time?



The big difference is *voice*. Voice changes everything. The Poke books are written in a close third person, which I try to keep neutral; ideally, it should to be a window through which we see the story. It shouldn't call attention to itself.

The Juniors are in his first person, which is devi-

ous, skeptical, and crooked. There's as much injustice and violence in a Bender as there is in a Rafferty. It's the voice that makes them so different.

Graham Greene sometimes divided his novels into literature and entertainments. You consider the Rafferty novels more "serious" than the Bender books, but I think that Bender is today's Los Angeles as Raymond Chandler would have written it.

I love Greene, but I *hate* that division of his work into books and something less than books. I think categorizing fiction in genres is meretricious and insulting. A good book is a good book. Yes, some books are better than others. But you don't catch art historians specializing in Renaissance frescoes saying "Giotto was an artist but Taddeo Gaddi was a cartoonist."

Fiction exists largely to allow us to live lives we otherwise couldn't. The revelation of character by crisis is a basic mechanism of virtually all fiction, no matter what "genre."

Bangkok and Los Angeles come to life as characters in their own right. Tell us about the importance of setting in your work.

I think of setting as the interaction between character and place.

Rafferty's Bangkok is actually *several* Bangkoks. It's Miaow's, a child abandoned on the sidewalk. It's Rose's, forced into the sex trade there as a teenager; and it's Poke's, who arrived there as a Western adult. If the city feels three-dimensional, maybe it's because we see multiple perspectives.

Junior's Los Angeles is a *burglar's* L.A. A burglar sees expensive houses differently than someone with a map to the stars' homes. To a crook, what realtors

call a *cul de sac* is just a dead end. I'd look at your living room and say something like "Nice rug," and Junior would be spotting everything worth pocketing.

Writers tend to shrivel unless they grow. What can you do to get better with each novel?

I think all good work is done on tiptoe. You have to stretch to grow.

Next year's Poke, *The Hot Countries*, is about guys in their seventies who came to Bangkok straight from Vietnam, one of whom has early Alzheimer's. I'd never done anything like that before.


The challenge with Junior is keeping him convincing without making him The Hallmark Burglar, stealing from the bad and leaving sparkly gifts for the kiddies.


What recent books do you most admire?

David Mitchell's *The Bone Clocks* and Wendy Hornsby's *The Color of Light*. And I just finished the ARC of your 2015 book, *A Scourge of Vipers*, the best yet in your wonderful Liam Mulligan series.

My first real encounter with the Friends of Mystery was at Left Coast Crime in Seattle in 2007. It was my first LCC, and I was attending as an almost debut author. In my hands I had a couple of precious ARCs of *Lost Dog*, due out two months hence, with no idea what I was supposed to do with them.

Fortunately, Elinore Rogers, then president of Friends of Mystery, helped me out. At the banquet—shortly after Parnell Hall performed—she waved me over to her table. "Your book will be out soon, right?

The Spotted Owl Committee would love to read it, if you've got a copy." Why, yes. *I do!* But how, I wondered, did she know? Sure, we'd met briefly at one of the Friends of Mystery Bloody Thursday events the previous fall, but at that point I'd been painfully shy, so I'd mentioned my forthcoming debut very quietly, below the threshold of actual sound, and thereby saved myself the pain of the rejection I fully expected.

Of course, if you've met Elinore, or any of the long time executive committee

members of the Friends of Mystery, you know my terror was wholly unfounded. A nicer, more welcoming group of folks you won't find anywhere. Their delight in mysteries and thrillers is deep and infectious. In addition to their love of established voices, they're always on the lookout for newcomers to the genre, which is why Elinore so graciously reached out to me. The Friends of Mystery isn't just the name of the organization, it's the very essence of who they are—friends, supporters, cheerleaders and more.

So what is Friends of Mystery, exactly? Based in Portland, the organization is a non-profit dedicated to the study and promotion of all aspects of mystery, including fiction, true crime, and the investigation and solving of crime. Five times a year FOM hosts Bloody Thursdays, public events that feature speakers covering a range of topics. Program Coordinator Johnny Shaw, and—*ahem*—little ol' me.




Phillip Margolin was born in NYC in 1944 and grew up in Levittown, Long Island. After graduating from American University in Washington, D.C. in 1965, he joined the Peace Corps and served

in Liberia for two years. In 1970, after marrying and graduating from New York University law school, he and his wife moved to Oregon where he was a clerk to the Chief Judge of the Oregon Court of Appeals. Two years later he opened a private practice specializing in criminal defense at the trial and appellate levels. During his 25 year practice he represented almost 30 people charged with homicide, including several who faced the death penalty. He was the first Oregon attorney to use the Battered Woman's Syndrome to defend a woman accused of murdering her spouse.

Soon after the success of his third novel, the bestseller Gone But Not Forgotten (1993), Margolin abandoned his law practice and became a full-time writer. He has published almost 20 mystery novels, many of them best sellers. His most recent novels include a young adult novel, Vanishing Acts, written with his daughter Ami Rome, and a historical mystery, Worthy

Brown's Daughter, based on a 19th century story of murder and slavery in Oregon. His most recent novel is Woman With a Gun.

About 20 years ago Margolin was a founder






of Chess for Success, a non-profit charity that uses chess to teach study skills to elementary and middle school children. Chess remains one of Margolin's passions, along with his family, football, food, and film.

> Mentioning Phil's passion is a good lead-in to a few personal remarks about this remarkable author and friend. All of his characteristics combine to make Phil one of the most charming and persuasive people I know. There is no hesitation, tentativeness, or ambivalence about him. He is able to focus totally on the issue of the moment, whether it's figuring out a chess move or a plot turn. Like many of his fictional murderers, he is a person of extreme likes and dislikes. (But unlike the sociopaths in his fiction, his passion never becomes obsession.)

> > Even when he is

wrong, as he is frequently about movies and books, his ability to argue his flawed case with charm and persistence evokes not hostility but admiration. And since winning is so important to him, and he's so likeable and so positive that he's right, you want him to win, and begin to doubt your own view. Perhaps that zombie movie should have won the best picture



award, perhaps that accused murderer is innocent. In any event I know whom I would want to defend me in a criminal trial.

The First Fifteen Years of Left Coast Crime

Marvin Lachman's history is invaluable for the longtime mystery convention-goer, and a great introduction for newcomers. Marv was Fan Guest of Honor at Left Coast Crime in Santa Fe in 2011. His latest book is *The Villainous Stage: Crime Plays on Broadway and in the West End* (McFarland 2014).

O ne convention a year was not enough for fans, and people thought of regional conventions that would be more intimate than Bouchercons and involve less travel. The East Coast had had Malice Domestic since 1989, and a successful Midwest Mystery & Suspense Convention was held in Omaha in 1990.

Bryan Barrett decided to chair a San Francisco conference for 1991.

There was indecision as to what to call it. Early ads called it "Crime-One," but it was later referred to variously as West Coast Crime Conference, Western Regional Mystery Conference, and Left Coast Crime Conference before the simpler "Left Coast Crime" (LCC), which has proven popular, was arrived at.

The program book said it was celebrating two important events in the mystery [world]: the 150th anniversary of what is generally accepted as the first detective story (by Poe) and the 50th anniversary of Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine. However, the program also acknowledged the growth of mysteries set on the Pacific Coast, "Perhaps the freshest crimes are being committed in the imaginations of our New West writers, in the solid traditions of Poe and Queen, to be sure, but also on the firm basis of Chandler and Hammett.... It is today's Western states inheritors of the tradition—authors, readers, collectors,

and critics—that we intend to celebrate here."


The first LCC, February 15-18, 1991, at the Sir Francis Drake hotel in San Francis-


co, invited two residents of nearby Sonoma County,

Bill Pronzini and Marcia Muller, as Guests of Honor, and Bruce Taylor, owner of San Francisco's leading mystery bookstore, as Toastmaster. Panels dealt with such local issues as the environment and gay and lesbian detectives. The banquet was held in John's Grill, a restaurant Sam Spade visited in *The Maltese Falcon*. A popular attraction during LCC, as at San Francisco Bouchercons, was Don Herron's Dashiell Hammett Walk.

That fewer than 200 people attended was due to several factors. The LCC committee did not have access to a mailing list of attendees at prior conferences. Also, the Gulf War, with threats of terrorism, had made many reluctant to fly. Perhaps the small size of the conference made it so enjoyable for many. As Len Moffatt reported, "Left Coast Crime was fun mostly because we got to visit with friends who stepped right off of the pages of [mystery fan magazines]."

Donna Rankin, treasurer for the first Left Coast Crime, chaired the second in 1992. It remained in




San Francisco but moved to the Holiday Inn in Union Square. On Saturday night, the Chinese New Year's parade could be seen from the windows of the room in which authors were autographing books. Two Washington State writers, Earl Emerson and J.A. Jance, were Guests of Honor, and James Lee Burke came from Montana to be Toastmaster. Peter Davison, then playing Albert Campion on *Mystery!*, attended and was very accessible. Another attendee was Sara Paretsky, wearing a button saying, "Don't judge a book by its movie," recognition of the poor reception given V.I. Warshawski, the film version of her work. Lia Matera chaired a panel on social issues, always a popular topic in San Francisco. "Fireside Chats," intimate interviews and readings with individual authors, was also popular; attendance at each was limited to fifty people.

Though some hoped LCC would remain in the Bay Area, others were anxious to have it in their backyards, and LCC #3 moved in 1993 to the Hyatt Regency Alicante near Disneyland in Anaheim. Kevin Moore and Kathy Johnson were co-chairwomen. Sue Dunlap and Julie Smith were the Guests of Honor, and Ann and Evan Maxwell were Toastmasters. Attendance reached 400. A Sunday night banquet was unpopular with some people because it ended too late for their trip home, and they felt they were forced to spend for an extra night's lodging.

Left Coast Crime returned to the Anaheim location in 1994,







with Kevin Moore again as chairwoman. Aaron Elkins was Guest of Honor, with Carolyn G. Hart as Toastmaster. Programming was limited to two tracks, allowing people to see more without having to make difficult choices. Sex in the mystery was discussed at many panels. In what was becoming a LCC tradition, there was a group autographing session of authors.

Left Coast Crime had been meant for locations in the Pacific and Mountain time zones, but some Californians questioned the non-coastal location of the 1995 LCC at the Old Town Holiday Inn in Scottsdale, Arizona. Barbara Peters of the Poisoned Pen Bookstore there managed the convention, with Jean Hanus as chairwoman.


Two Albuquerque writers were honored. Tony Hillerman was Guest of Honor, and Judith Van Gieson was Toastmaster. Robert B. Parker was also a Special Guest. P.D. James was in Scottsdale on a book tour but didn't attend LCC. Neither she nor Parker was at the authors' signing Saturday night. Again, there were only two tracks of programs. In line with the Southwestern location, three panels under the general title "The Modern Gunslinger" were held, but they dealt with mysteries, not Westerns.


Left Coast Crime moved further inland in 1996 to the Clarion Hotel in Boulder, Colorado. Tom and Enid Schantz of Rue Morgue Books there chaired it. Because Boulder is at 7000 feet, they called this LCC "Murder with an


Altitude." Over 450 people attended. The location provoked some controversy because Boulder had probably the strictest non-smoking code at that time in the United States. Ann Williams of Denver registered, but cancelled when she learned the only place she could smoke was in her room. She said, "The pious majority in Boulder has zero tolerance for minority rights." Others who attended said they enjoyed the absence of second-hand smoke and it was the only mystery convention at which they felt free to go into the bar, normally a smoke-filled place.

Kinky Friedman was Guest of Honor and Nevada Barr Toastmaster. A cabaret was held Saturday night at the Boulder Theater. Parnell Hall was a hit with one of his songs, and Alan Russell and Jeremiah Healy serenaded Left Coast Crime's first Fan Guest of Honor, Mary "Maggie" Mason. Some thought Friedman's performance (including a song about mucus) was tasteless and walked out on him.

For the first time the "Lefty" Award was given. Saluting the best humorous mystery of the previous year, it was given to Alan Russell for *The Fat Innkeeper*. The award took the form of a plaster impression of a left hand, "posed" for by Enid Schantz. Panels in Boulder, which had three tracks, included "Collecting the Hypermodern," then at its peak. I explored another aspect in a one-man panel, "Book Collecting for Po' Folks," describing the fun (and bargains) found







at library sales, garage sales, and second-hand stores.

In 1997, LCC came to the Stouffer Renaissance (formerly Madison) in Seattle, where 1994's Bouchercon was held, with Andi Shechter as chairwoman. There were joint Guests of Honor, the husband-and-wife team of Jonathan and Faye Kellerman. Lia Matera was Toastmaster. Because the Kellermans are Orthodox Jews, their participation was limited to Sunday when their speeches at the brunch were well received. Attendees were disappointed when Jonathan, due to carpal tunnel syndrome, couldn't sign his books, though he had a stamp of his signature.

About 400 people attended. Again, the timing did not please everyone. Advertised as running from Thursday through Sunday LCC had few Thursday panels. By Sunday afternoon, there were only two panels remaining. Some said that had they but known, they'd not have booked for Sunday evening. At the auction, emcees Bruce Taylor and Parnell Hall raised \$1,700 for the Northwest Literacy Foundation and a battered-women's shelter.

In 1998 Left Coast Crime was at San Diego's Bahia Hotel and Resort in the Mission Bay area. Elizabeth George, the Southern Californian who writes about England, was Guest of Honor, and local author Alan Russell was Toastmaster. A noted San Diego book collector, Willis Herr, was posthumous Fan Guest of Honor.

A Lifetime Achievement Award went to another local, novelist-reviewer Robert Wade.

Left Coast Crime started at Albuquerque's Hyatt Regency Friday, March 5, 1999, but for me it started the night before, when reliving my Mystery Readers' bashes in the Bronx, I had a party for a dozen mystery fans at my home in Santa Fe, seventy miles away. John Dunning was LCC Guest of Honor; Deborah Crombie, a Texan who sets her mysteries in England, was Toastmaster; Tasha Mackler, formerly a mystery bookstore owner in Albuquerque, was Fan Guest of Honor. Harlen Campbell, who had recently published his first mystery, was chairman.

The theme of this LCC was "the literary mystery," and Dunning tried to stick to this topic in his Saturday night banquet speech. It proved unsatisfying since Dunning couldn't seem to decide whether the mystery should be "escape" or "great literature." The same indecisiveness was present in Campbell's interview with him, in which he opined that the mystery can be "literature," but because it is essen-

tially plot-driven and has rules, it doesn't permit the freedom to explore character that mainstream fiction does. The success of Dunning's own *Booked to Die* (1992), a highly collectible "hypermodern" book, was due to its combination of old-fashioned detective story and book collecting lore, gathered by Dunning in the years he owned a Denver bookstore.

Panels on publishing again proved popular as LCC invited a new group of hopeful mystery writers. Increasingly, as lobby space at hotels seemed limited, the book room was the place fans gathered to talk, a trend not unpopular with dealers.

In 2000, Left Coast Crime returned to Arizona at Tucson's Holiday Inn City Center, and the weather in mid-March was hot. Sue Grafton, author of the popular alphabet series, was Guest of Honor. Harlan Coben came from New Jersey to be Toastmaster. George Easter, editor-publisher of *Deadly Pleasures*, was Fan Guest of Honor. Maggie Mason organized "The Easter Egg Caper," gathering egg-shaped pantyhose containers and having George's friends insert notes

to him. In what was proving a regular event, Mason's team won the trivia contest, one patterned after the TV show *Jeopardy*. She modestly claimed her success was due to naming her team "The Golden Retrievers," her favorite breed of dog.

More than a dozen fans had an enjoyable dinner at a local Cajun-Creole restaurant owned by Elmore Leonard's son Chris and his wife. A large committee made this LCC a success, with Ellie Warder handling four different functions. The program was varied, though Friday's panels leaned in the direction of police procedure, with two DNA Fingerprinting Workshops. Literacy continued as the charity of choice, and there were both silent and live auctions to help Literacy Volunteers of Tucson.

Alaska in mid-February seemed a dubious attraction, but there was general agreement that Left Coast Crime at the Anchorage Hilton in 2001 was a good convention. Even the weather cooperated, with temperatures generally in the twenties. Many attendees took the opportunity of their first Alaska trips to spend a few extra days seeing scenery and wildlife; some reported seeing moose on the streets of downtown Anchorage. To encourage Alaska's native population to read, the local branch of Sisters in Crime organized a project called "Authors to the Bush," in which writers volunteered to go in small planes to remote settlements to promote reading. Linda Billington chaired this convention in which Michael Connelly was US Guest of Honor, Lindsey Davis was British Guest of Honor, and Andi Schechter was Fan Guest of Honor.

Recognizing Portland, Oregon's damp climate, Left Coast Crime 2002 at the Columbia River Doubletree Hotel was called "Slugs and Roses." Bryan Barrett and Thom Walls were co-chairmen, Laurie R. King and Steven Saylor, known primarily for their historical mysteries, were Guests of Honor. Don Herron was Fan Guest of Honor, and G.M. Ford of Seattle the Toastmaster. Mary Mason saw fewer collectors in the book room, though many who attended took the time to visit the world-famous Powell's bookstore.

Few hospitality suites received as high ratings as the one at the Doubletree.

Left Coast Crime returned to the Pasadena Hilton in 2003. One 1991 problem that had not been solved was annoying spillover of sound when the main ballroom was split into two meeting rooms without soundproof dividers. Otherwise, this LCC was a success, enjoyed by its largest crowd to date, about 600 people.

Robert Crais was Guest of Honor; Sue Feder was Fan Guest of Honor; Jerrilyn Farmer was Toastmaster. The famous radio play "Sorry, Wrong Number" was recreated at the Pasadena Library, with attendees bused there and back. Los Angeles writer-fan Paul Bishop had an interesting conference. After a panel "Cops vs. Coppers," regarding the US police and their British counterparts, he went to compete in the Los Angeles Marathon, finishing twenty-six-plus miles in three hours forty-three minutes. He also received "hate mail" from the wife of a judge who was in attendance at his panel. She thought he was being disrespectful to the law, despite his twenty-six years service as an LAPD officer.

The Doubletree Hotel in Monterey, scene of 1997 Bouchercon, was the locale for the equally successful 2004 Left Coast Crime, with about 850 attending. Bill and Toby Gottfried were co-chairs. Sharan Newman and Walter Mosley were the Guests of Honor. Newman did a slide show on the art, history, and costuming of 12th century France, the setting for her historical mysteries. Bryan Barrett and Thom Walls were Fan Guests of Honor. Gillian Roberts was Toastmaster, and Richard Lupoff received a Lifetime Achievement Award. A new award was instituted, the Bruce Alexander History Mystery Award, in honor of the writer who had died three months before LCC. The committee also instituted a one-time award, the Otter for the best mystery set in the Monterey area. The auction benefitted the Friends of Sea Otters, and the opening reception was at the renowned Monterey Bay Aquarium. 26

Left Coast Crime Awards

The Lefty Award is given for the most humorous mystery published in the prior year, and was first awarded in 1996. The LCC Bylaws now require each annual convention to give a Lefty. In addition, each convention can give up to three additional awards. The Bruce Alexander Memorial Historical Mystery Award, first given in 2004, has become standard by tradition. This award is given for the best historical mystery novel, generally covering events at least 50 earlier.

Other awards have been given from time to time, such as regional awards for the best mystery set in the LCC geographical region (Mountain & Pacific time zones in North America and west to Hawaii). These awards have been variously named depending on the convention location: e.g., Otter (Monterey 2004), Calavera (El Paso 2005), Rocky (Denver 2008 & Colorado Springs 2013), Squid (Monterey 2014), and this year's Rose Award. Other flavors of regional award include the Panik (Los Angeles 2010), the Hillerman Sky (Santa Fe 2011), and the Calamari (Monterey 2014).

Awards for best first mystery include the Eureka! (Sacramento 2012) and this year's Rosebud. And let's not forget the Watson, for the mystery with the best sidekick (Santa Fe 2011 & Colorado Springs 2013).




